Word	What it means
vaudeville	a type of entertainment popular in the US in the early 20th century, featuring a mixture of specialty acts such as comedy and song and dance
stereotypes	a widely held but fixed and oversimplified image or idea of a particular type of person or thing
minstrel	a medieval singer or musician, especially one who sang or recited poetry to a musical accompaniment for royals
supplement	something that completes or enhances something else when added to it
domestic	relating to the running of a home or to family relations
demeaning	causing someone to lose their dignity and the respect of others
acclaimed	praised enthusiastically and publicly
escort	a person, vehicle, or group accompanying another for protection or as a mark of rank
segregated	separated or divided along racial, gender, or religious lines
beacon	a fire or light set up in a high or prominent position as a warning, signal, or celebration
typecasting	assign an actor or actress repeatedly to the same type of role, as a result of their appearance or previous success in such roles
interred	place a corpse in a grave or tomb, typically with funeral rites
