## 20 TO SHIFT FROM CRITICISM CUESTIONS TO CURIOSITY

Curiosity moves feedback forward. These questions turn critique into conversation, helping educators and students build trust, reflect, and grow.

## **Giving Feedback**

Invite reflection, openness, and possibility with these questions:

- What inspired this approach?
- Can you walk me through your thinking here?
- What outcome were you hoping for?
- What part of this feels strongest to you?
- Where did you take a creative risk?
- Mow did you decide on this strategy?
- What surprised you during the process?
- If you had more time, what would you expand or revise?
- Is there a part you're unsure about?
- What connections did you try to make?

## Receiving Feedback

Stay open, grounded, and curious with these reflections:

- What's one thing I could try differently next time?
- What part of this didn't land and why?
- What strengths can I build on here?
- Where might I have confused or lost clarity?
- What pattern might I be missing?
- Mow could I invite more engagement or connection?
- What feedback have I heard before and what can I do with it now?
- Is this a one-off opinion, or do I hear a theme?
- What's one question I can ask to understand more?
- How can I use this feedback to take my next creative step?

## **Ideas for Use:**

- Use in student peer reviews, writing conferences, or class discussions.
- Pair with rubrics or reflection forms.
- Post one question per week to focus class discussion.
- Practice self-feedback using one question at the end of an assignment.
