



Big changes in education can feel impossible, but small, evolutionary shifts add up to lasting impact. The good news is that creativity doesn't require a full curriculum overhaul! Here some ways to easily bring creativity into your classroom.

Start with "What if?" Questions

Kick off a lesson by asking one imaginative question. It sets the tone for curiosity.

Change One Thing

Take a familiar lesson and tweak just one element of it (ex: format, materials, or outcome).

Use Choice Boards

Offer 2-3 ways students can show understanding.

Build in Pauses

Give students 90 seconds of silent thinking before sharing answers.

Celebrate Process over Product

Highlight effort, risk-taking, and "almost there" moments alongside finished work.

Flip a Routine

Reverse the order of a standard procedure (ex: discussion before reading, drawing before writing, movement before math).

Ask for Multiple Answers

Instead of "What's the right answer?", ask "What are three ways to solve this?"

Make it Visual

Encourage students to sketch, doodle, or map an idea before writing it out.

Add Joy

Use a quick improv game, a short song, or a "mystery bag" object to energize students.

Reflect Creatively

End the day with a reflection prompt like "Draw how you felt learning today" or "Give me one metaphor for what we did."

Small shifts create big change.

Try these tweaks and notice the difference in your classroom energy.
